## 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

In the Last five years, the University has undertaken several measures, which can be labelled as best practices in curricular aspects:

The University has been alive to the fast-changing social and economic scenario. It has introduced several courses such as physiotherapy, biotechnology, bio-informatics, dress designing and tailoring, cosmetology, dietetics, tour and travel management, human genetics, industrial micro-chemistry, insurance business etc.

The University has very liberally promoted the adoption of UGC-sponsored add-on courses which

include interior designing, environmental education, agro-services, rural handicrafts, data-care management, tourism, instrumentation, fashion designing, tax procedures & practices, entrepreneurship & small business, and communication skills.

The University has adopted the semester system in place of the annual system of examination for more effective organization of teaching and evaluation. This includes the introduction of internal assessment on the triple criteria of attendance, testing and assignments/classroom performance.

The syllabi are revised at least once every two years in view of the feedback received from various sources and the changing requirements.

## 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- Transparency is maintained in the whole of the admission process. Reservation of seats for differently abled individuals is strictly followed as directed by the State Government.
- The Semester system has been introduced and internal assessment has been made part of the evaluation programme.
- The University has created a placement cell which looks after the placement of all the students of the University. A counselling cell is also established in the department of Psychology.
- Establishment of Neighbourhood Campuses at Bathinda, Talwandi Sabo, SAS Nagar, Malerkotla, Dehradoon, Jaito, Rampura Phul, Jhuneer, Karandi, Sardulgarh, Joga Ralla Dehla Seehan has been a unique innovation which is done for the academic growth of the rural and economically poor sections of the society.
- A unique and innovative way of financing higher education has been introduced in Yadwindra College of Engineering, Talwandi Sabo and Engineering College, Rampura Phul. In these colleges rural students who are economically weaker are admitted and the expenditure of their studies is met through the donors from India and abroad.
- Most of the faculty has been trained in the use of computers, internet and audio visual aids.
- Modern educational technologies in teaching, such as multimedia teaching have been strengthened. Almost all the departments have been provided with computers and internet facilities.

One more thing we have implemented is single roll number for Nov. (odd Semester) & May (Even Semester) Examination with in year which saves time for preparing cultist and lots of paper work.

Internal Assessment of Students is received by Email / CD from particular College Scanning of the awards from Answer sheet given by the examiners after evaluating the answer books and finally preparation and declaration of the result with the help of scanner and software. With regard to conduct of university examination, Exam. Duty Roster and Panel is sent through email to particular person / Principal / HOD.

To strengthen the invigilation at examination centres, more Flying Squads are sent every session. This has helped in preventing the use of any kind of unfair means to greater extent.

Time-Table for evaluation process is prepared in advance and entire evaluation process is completed within 4 weeks from date of termination of examination to complete the result forthwith. For this purpose, centralized evaluation centres are set up every year.

The continuous interaction with the Industries is maintained through the Placement cell, by inviting the industry people in the departments, in various conferences, in meetings where we feel that their experience will be helpful to us.

Also from many of the departments students are send to the industry for projects and hand on experience of the industrial processes.

The faculty is encouraged to do the projects in collaboration with the industry.

#### 6.3.9 Admission of Students

For many of the departments the admission process right from the calling of applications to the allotment of seats have been made online. This has made the system more transparent and more convenient for the candidates seeking admissions in Punjabi University

## 6.4 Welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff

The University provides its staffers with a number of welfare schemes which benefit not only its employees, but their families as well. The schemes touch some very important aspects of human life like education, finance ,health care, transport, security, child care and recreation. The University 's Senior Secondary School provides affordable education to the children of a large number of University Employees. The Bhai Ghanaiya Health Centre is well-equipped to cater to all general and emergency medical services with a 24X7 Ambulance facility. It is providing health facility to 5000 employees including their immediate family members. The Physiotherapy Unit has been actively involved in providing services to the employees and their families. The University has a fitness centre which is well-equipped with latest state- of -art fitness machines. The University has a crèche facility which is being highly utilized especially by the female employees of the University. The University also provides transport facility to its employees and their families. Besides this University houses a branch of State Bank of Patiala which provides immense convenience regarding day to day financial transactions of the employees and their families. The University also provides a Group Insurance and Loan facility to its employees. The University's Holiday Home schemes provides an ambient atmosphere in the lap of nature for relaxation and rejuvenation. The University is especially committed for the security of women employees. University Campus is being monitored by CCTV cameras and mobile surveillance by lady police. Also Sexual Harassment Cell looks into any complaints related to gender -based offenses. The Ladies Club organizes summer camps for the children of the employees providing training to them in art, music and other recreational events.

One more thing we have implemented is single roll number for Nov. (odd Semester) & May (Even Semester) Examination with in year which saves time for preparing cultist and lots of paper work.

Internal Assessment of Students is received by Email / CD from particular College

Scanning of the awards from Answer sheet given by the examiners after evaluating the answer books and finally preparation and declaration of the result with the help of scanner and software.

Date-sheet of every university examination is also on website before examination start.

With regard to conduct of university examination, Exam. Duty Roster and Panel is sent through email to particular person / Principal / HOD.

To strengthen the invigilation at examination centres, more Flying Squads are sent every session. This has helped in preventing the use of any kind of unfair means to greater extent.

Time-Table for evaluation process is prepared in advance and entire evaluation process is completed within 4 weeks from date of termination of examination to complete the result forthwith. For this purpose, centralized evaluation centres are set up every year.

The Gazette Notifications of the all results and DMCs are prepared / printed on computer.

Increasing infrastructure of Computer Lab's by adding new Computers, Scanners, Printers and well trained staff.

- 6.11 Activities and support from the Alumni Association

Atleast once in a year, meeting of the Alumni Association is held. Pass out students are allowed to interact with the current students so that the students studying presently can be benefited from the experience of the pass students. In some cases, well settled students provide financial support to the economically weaker students presently studying in the University.

6.12 Activities and support from the Parent-Teacher Association

We don't have Parent-Teacher Association but we encourage the parent to visit the department, in which their ward is studying, on regular basis to get feedback about their children and also to give their valuable feedback to the Head of the department for further improvements in the department.

6.13 Development programmes for support staff

Staff is provided with the library facilities for their development. Computer centre runs short term training programs for the use of computers in the discharge of their duties. University has made a provision for special allowance to administrative staff who complete their computer training successfully. The teaching staff is also encouraged to attend short term programs conducted by other organisations which may help them in improving their knowledge. Also different departments conduct refresher courses, seminars and conferences which help in the development of teaching staff. IT Company Infosys trains the faculty of Engineering and Computer Science for conducting campus connect programs for the students. The employees are encouraged to go for short-term computer courses, three-year degree courses Law evening, Certificate in Yoga, and Diplomas and Certificate in French and German. In addition, the confirmed employees can avail the benefit of the courses available in the Department of Correspondence Courses with special incentives.

- 7.1 Innovations introduced during this academic year which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the institution. Give details.
  - Partial automation of examination system has been carried out during the academic year 2012-13 (like Registration process, preparation of final result).
  - The admission process is made centralised and it is fully automated. Applications are invited through online process and allotment of seats are also done centralised. Software for same is designed and developed in house without any help of external experts.
  - Sophisticated instruments centre established in the past to cater the research needs of science and engineering departments has been further strengthened to have more research facilities. Wi-Fi facilities in some hostels
  - To meet the challenges of 21st century, Punjabi University has anticipated that no language can develop and survive without technical development. Keeping this in view, Punjabi University, which has one of its primary goals of development of Punjabi language has established an Advanced Centre for Technical Development of Punjabi Language, Literature & Culture on Mother Tongue's day 21st Feb 2004. With the establishment of this centre, Punjabi University became the first University in the world to set up such a Centre. In a short period of its **establishment** many path breaking technologies have been developed by the staff of the centre and research students, which have simplified usage of Punjabi on computers and helped in bringing together the Punjabi community by breaking the script and language barriers. Some of the innovative technologies developed in 2012-13 are:

## An Intelligent Bilingual Legacy to Unicode Font Convertor (<a href="http://fc.learnpunjabi.org">http://fc.learnpunjabi.org</a>)

For the first time, an intelligent legacy to Unicode font convertor has been developed which uses statistical techniques to automatically detect font of any Punjabi and Hindi text and convert the text to Unicode. This utility is also very useful to convert **any** PDF file to Unicode or to convert text encoded in any unknown font to Unicode. This is first time that any such utility has been developed for any Indian language.

## Machine Translation (http://h2p.learnpunjabi.org)

A statistical Hindi-Punjabi machine translation system has been developed. The system can translate any Hindi text to Punjabi with a very high accuracy and has been provided online for free usage. This is the first machine translation system developed for Indian language pairs which can convert the text from Hindi to Punjabi using statistical techniques.

## **Optical Character Recognition (OCR)**

For the first time, a high accuracy multi-font bilingual Gurmukhi/English OCR has been developed which can recognize both Gurmukhi and English text printed in any font with more than 97% recognition accuracy at character level. This is the first bilingual OCR for any Indian language

**Protection of Biodiversity:** The Department regularly conducts survey with a view to identify the endangered and threatened plants and conserve them in the Plant conservatory established in an area of about 10 hectares just adjoining the Botanical Garden.

The Department exchanges plant wealth in the form of seeds, seedlings and cutting with different Institutions with a view to promote conservation and protection of important plants which are the vital components of our environment.

**Teaching of subject:** Besides the Department has introduced full fledged papers on Biodiversity and Environment and Plant Natural Resources, Conservation and Sustainable Development at undergraduate and postgraduate level so as to sensitize the students about environmental concerns and protection.

In all the Under Graduate Programmes of the University, a course on environmental studies and road safety is introduced which is compulsory for all.
